3 Terminology and guidelines

3.1 Definition: Operating requirement

An *operating requirement* is a specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that you must guarantee during operation to avoid incorrect operation and possibly decreasing the useful life of the chip.

3.1.1 Example

This is an example of an operating requirement:

3.2 Definition: Operating behavior

An *operating behavior* is a specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that are guaranteed during operation if you meet the operating requirements and any other specified conditions.

3.2.1 Example

This is an example of an operating behavior:

An *attribute* is a specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that are guaranteed, regardless of whether you meet the operating requirements.

3.4 Definition: Rating

A *rating* is a minimum or maximum value of a technical characteristic that, if exceeded, may cause permanent chip failure:

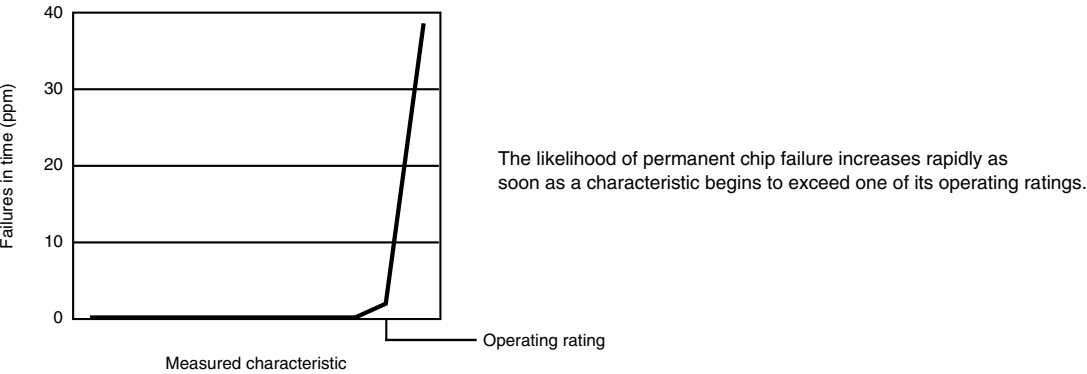
- *Operating ratings* apply during operation of the chip.
- *Handling ratings* apply when the chip is not powered.

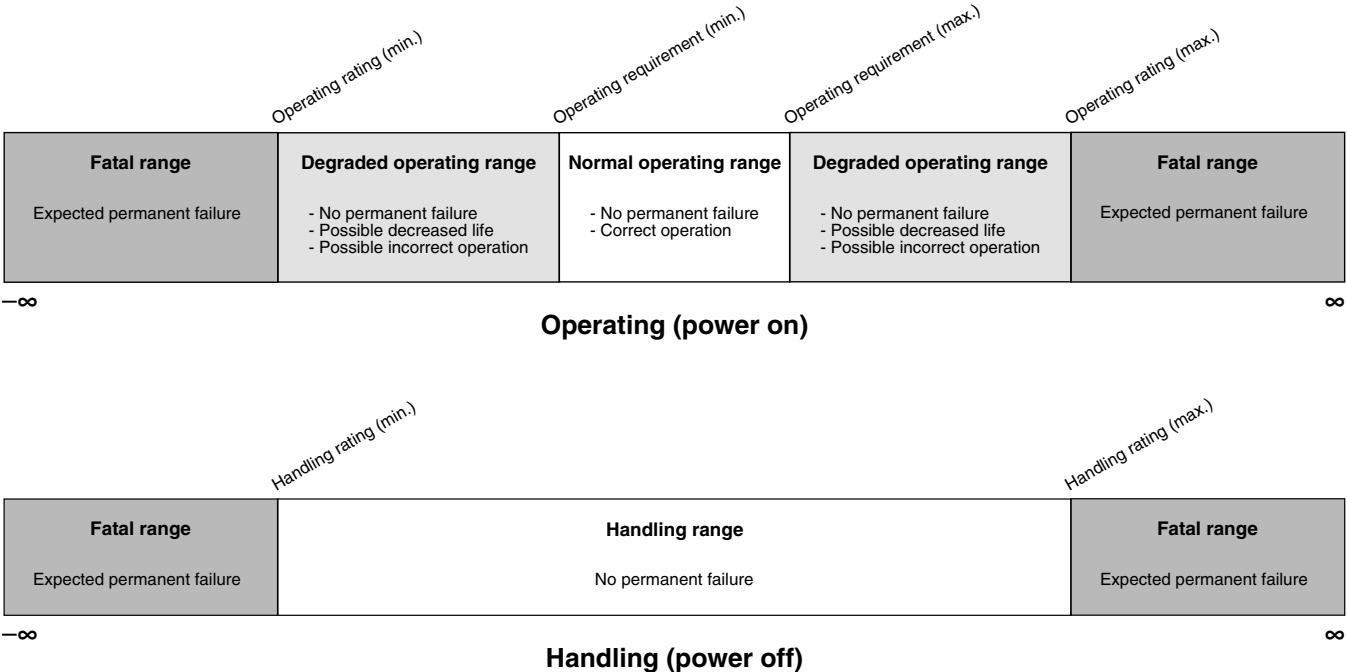

3.7 Guidelines for ratings and operating requirements

Follow these guidelines for ratings and operating requirements:

- Never exceed any of the chip's ratings.
- During normal operation, don't exceed any of the chip's operating requirements.
- If you must exceed an operating requirement at times other than during normal operation (for example, during power sequencing), limit the duration as much as possible.

3.8 Definition: Typical value

A *typical value* is a specified value for a technical characteristic that:

- Lies within the range of values specified by the operating behavior
- Given the typical manufacturing process, is representative of that characteristic during operation when you meet the typical-value conditions or other specified conditions

Typical values are provided as design guidelines and are neither tested nor guaranteed.

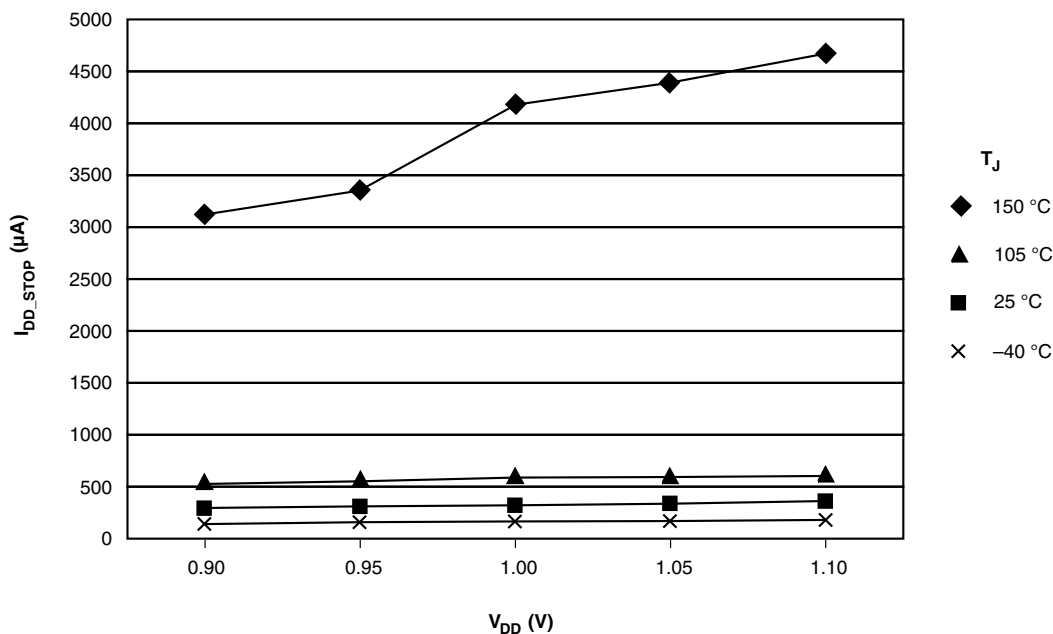

5 General

5.1 AC electrical characteristics

Unless otherwise specified, propagation delays are measured from the 50% to the 50% point, and rise and fall times are measured at the 20% and 80% points, as shown in the following figure.



Figure 1. Input signal measurement reference

 - have $C_L=30\text{pF}$ loads,
 - are configured for fast slew rate ($\text{PORTx_PCRn[SRE]}=0$), and

 - have their passive filter disabled ($\text{PORTx_PCRn[PFE]}=0$)

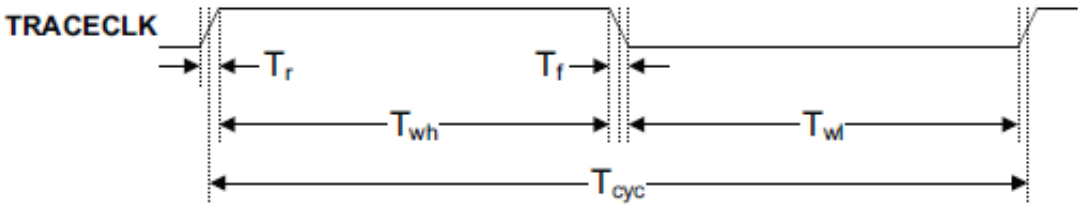


Figure 3. TRACE_CLKOUT specifications

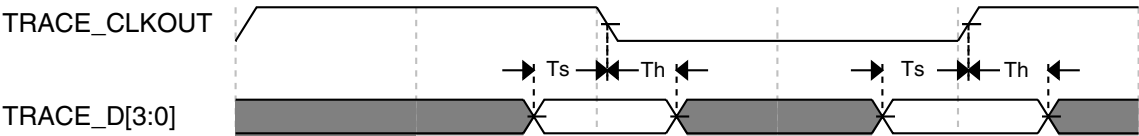


Figure 4. Trace data specifications

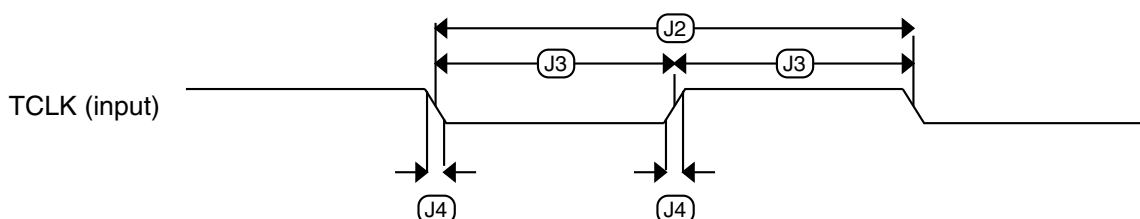


Figure 5. Test clock input timing

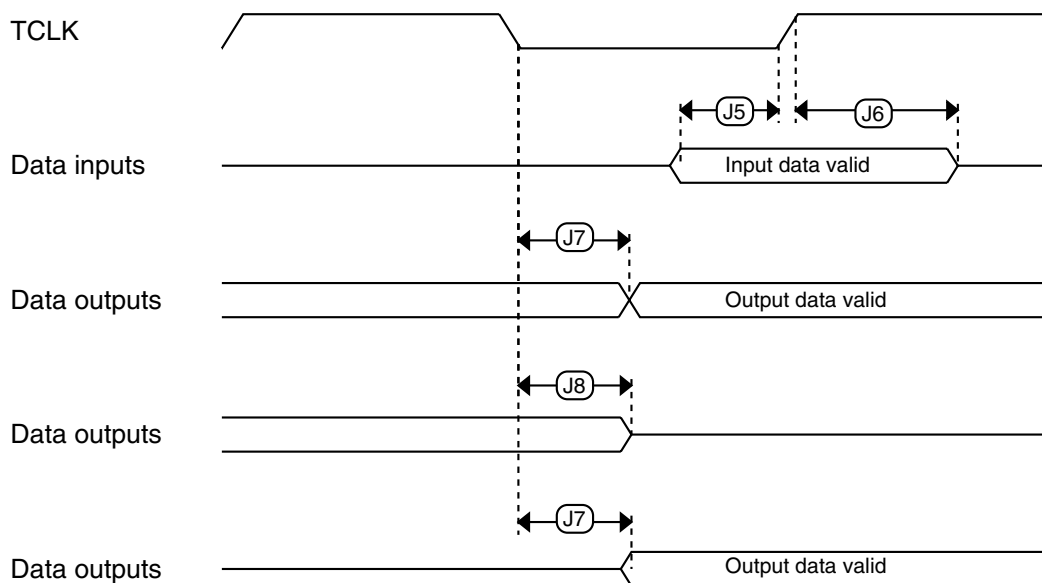


Figure 6. Boundary scan (JTAG) timing

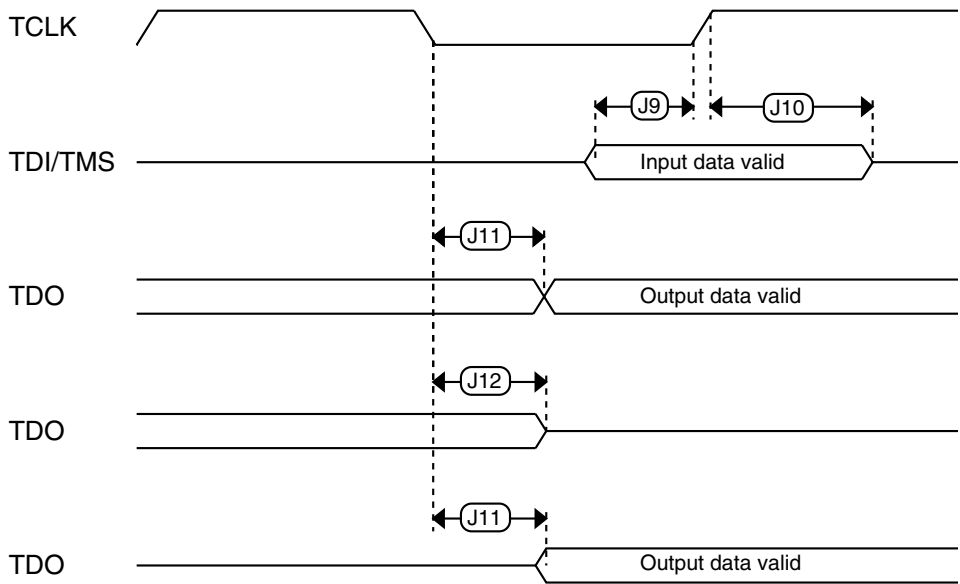


Figure 7. Test Access Port timing

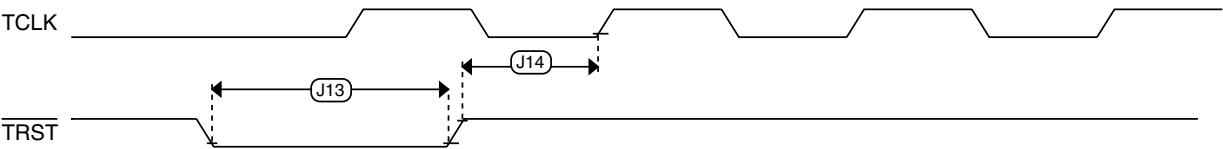


Figure 8. $\overline{\text{TRST}}$ timing

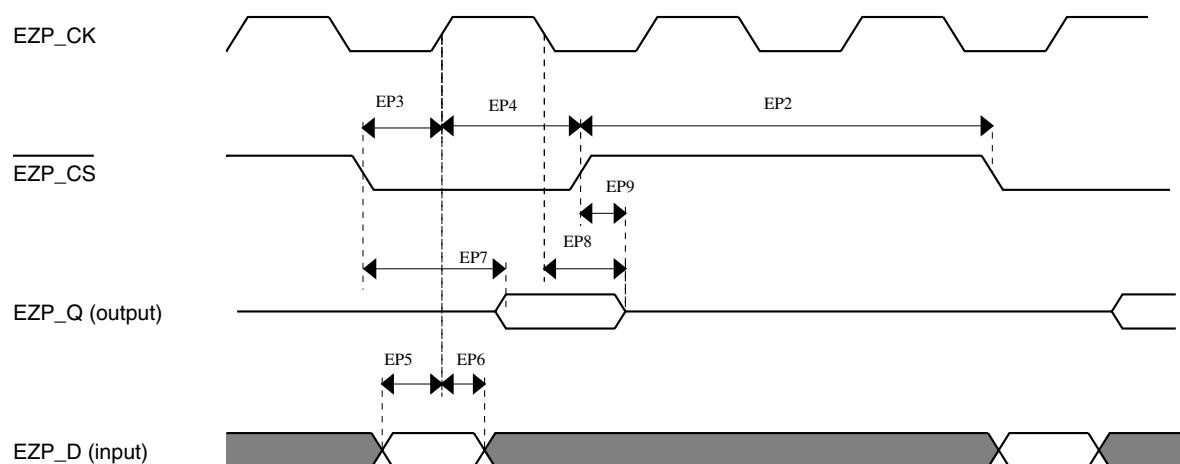

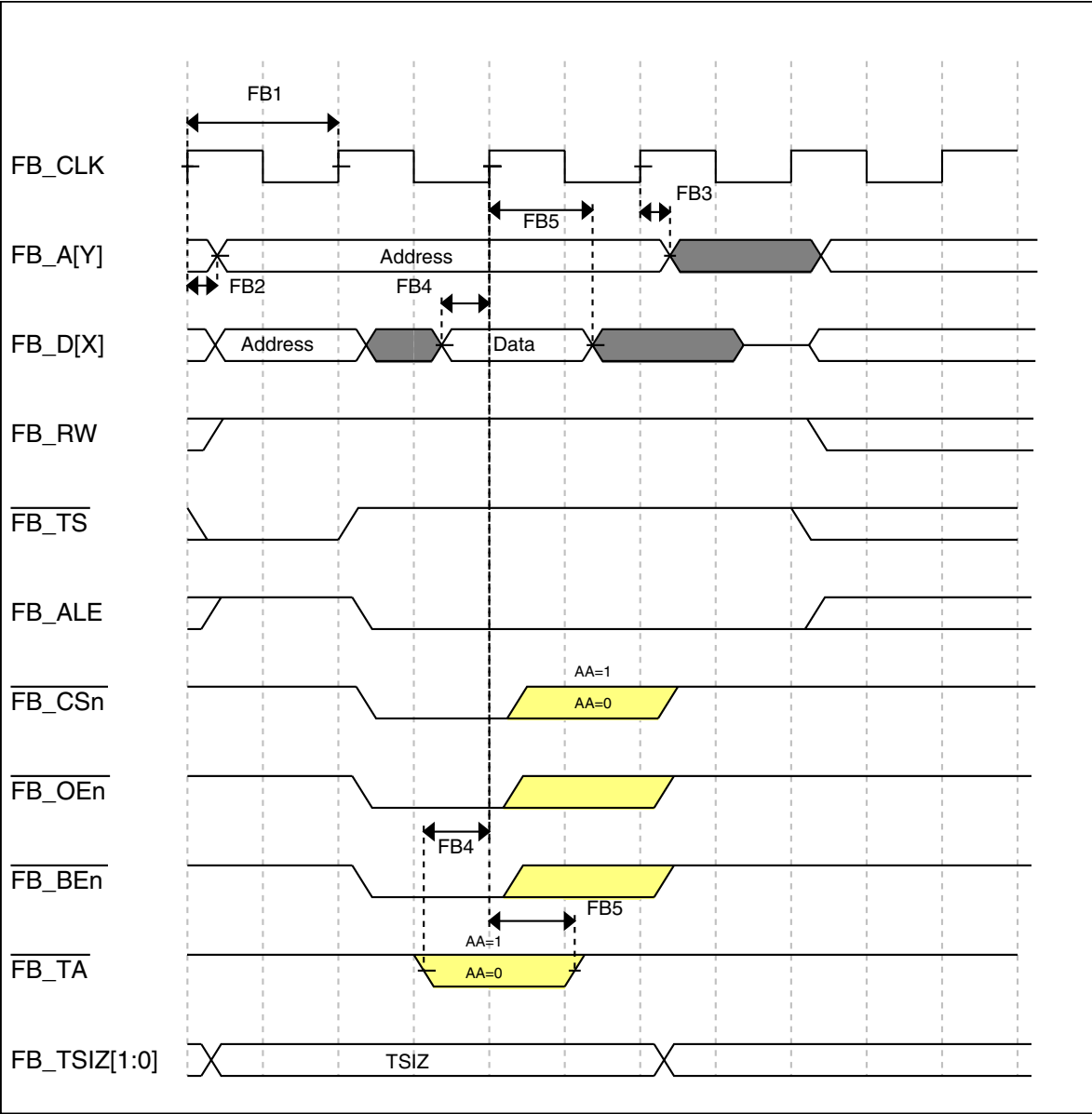


Figure 10. FlexBus read timing diagram

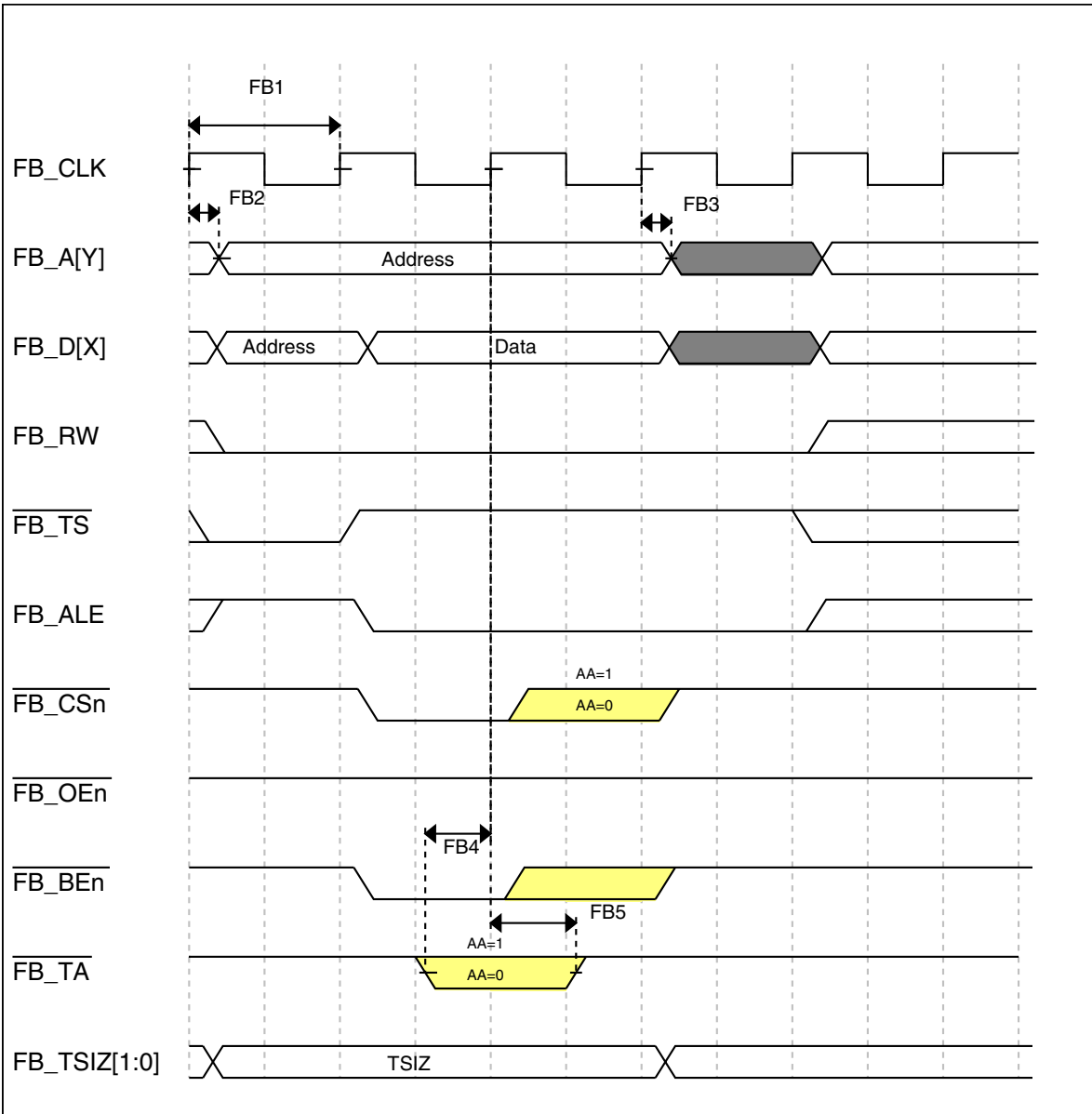


Figure 11. FlexBus write timing diagram

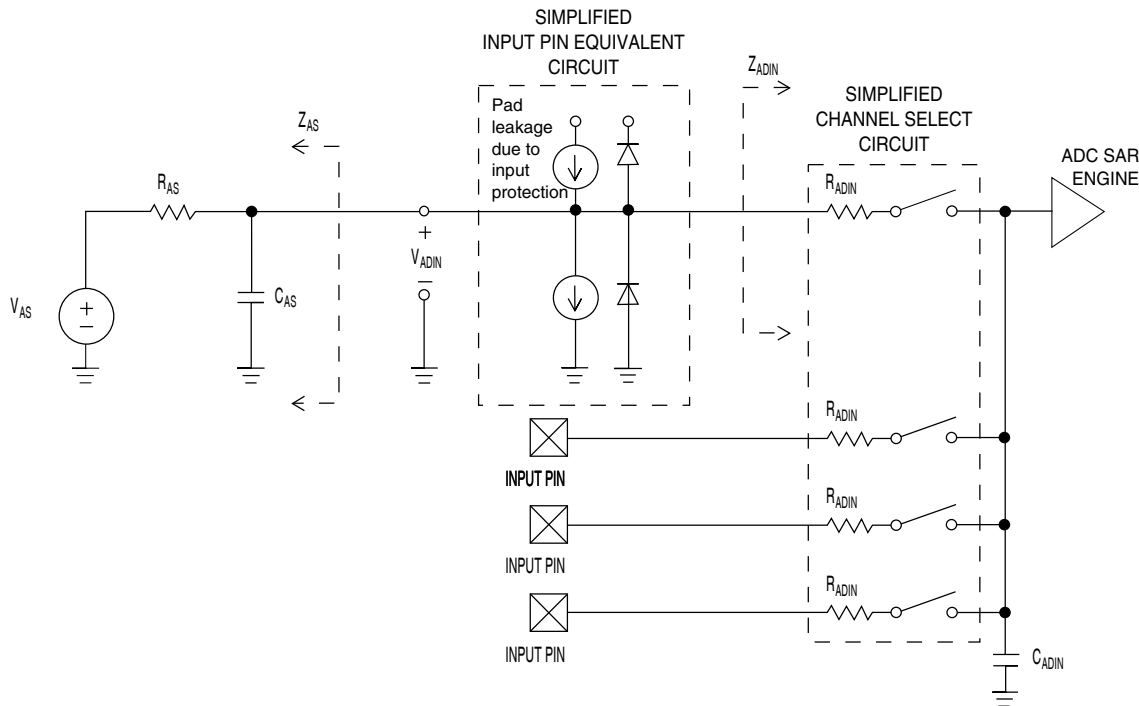


Figure 12. ADC input impedance equivalency diagram

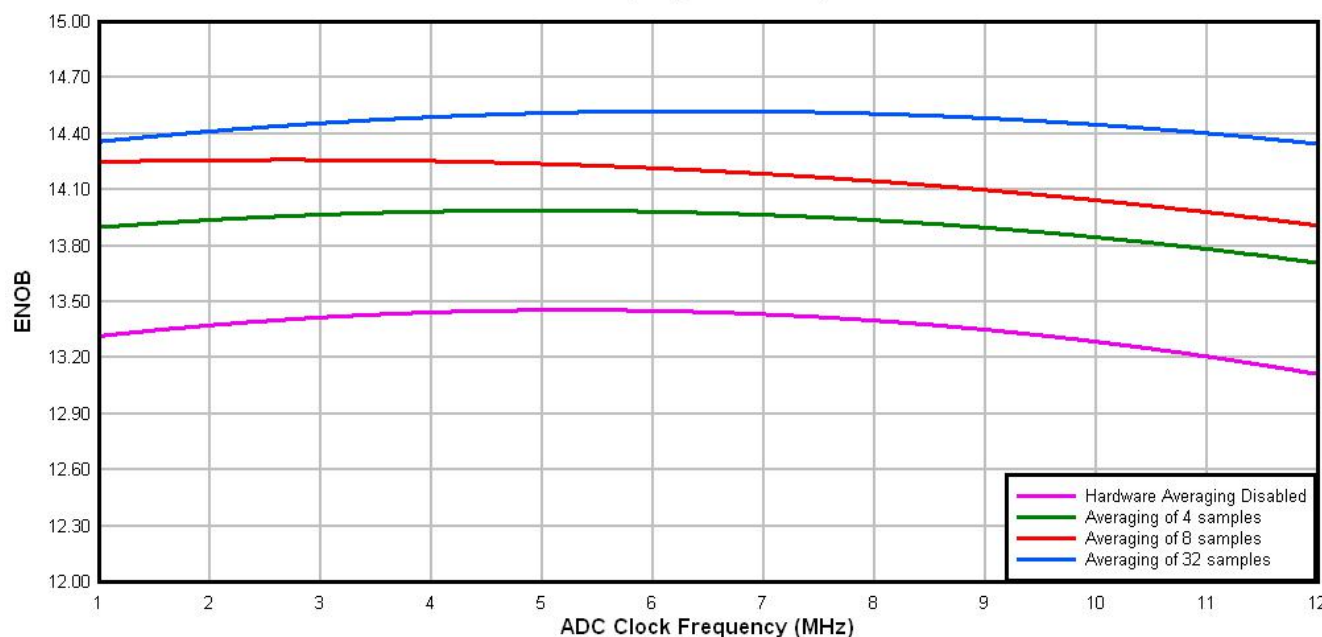

100Hz, 90% FS Sine Input

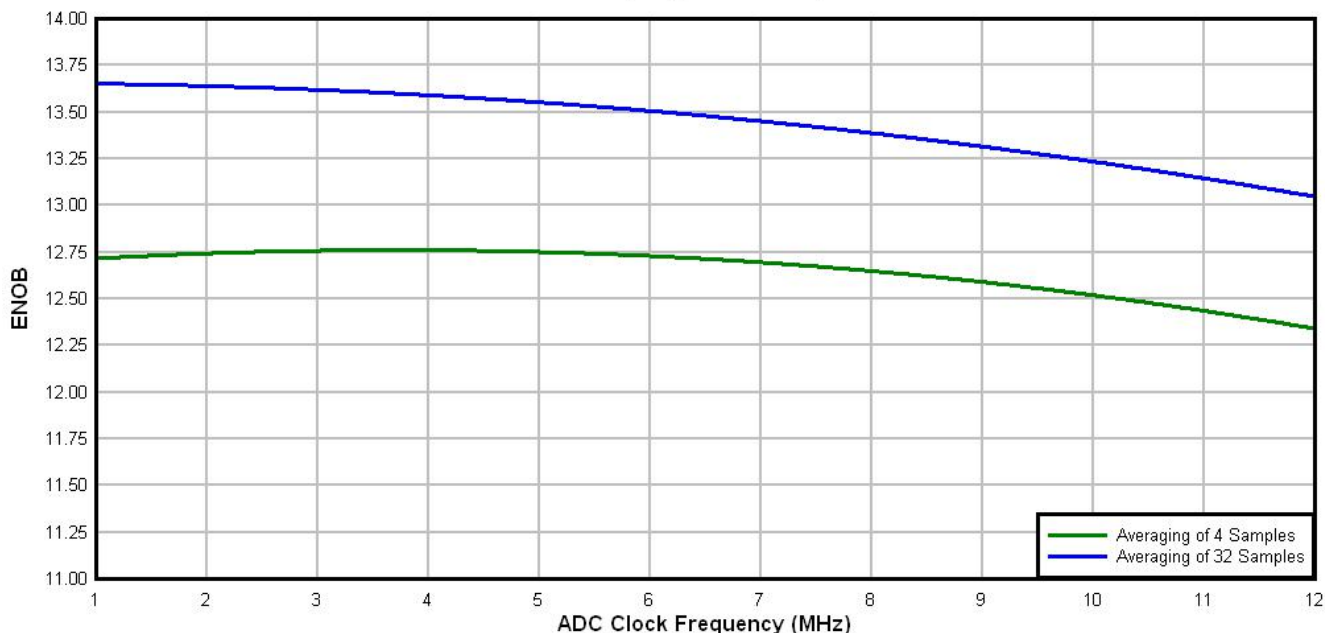


Figure 14. Typical ENOB vs. ADC_CLK for 16-bit single-ended mode

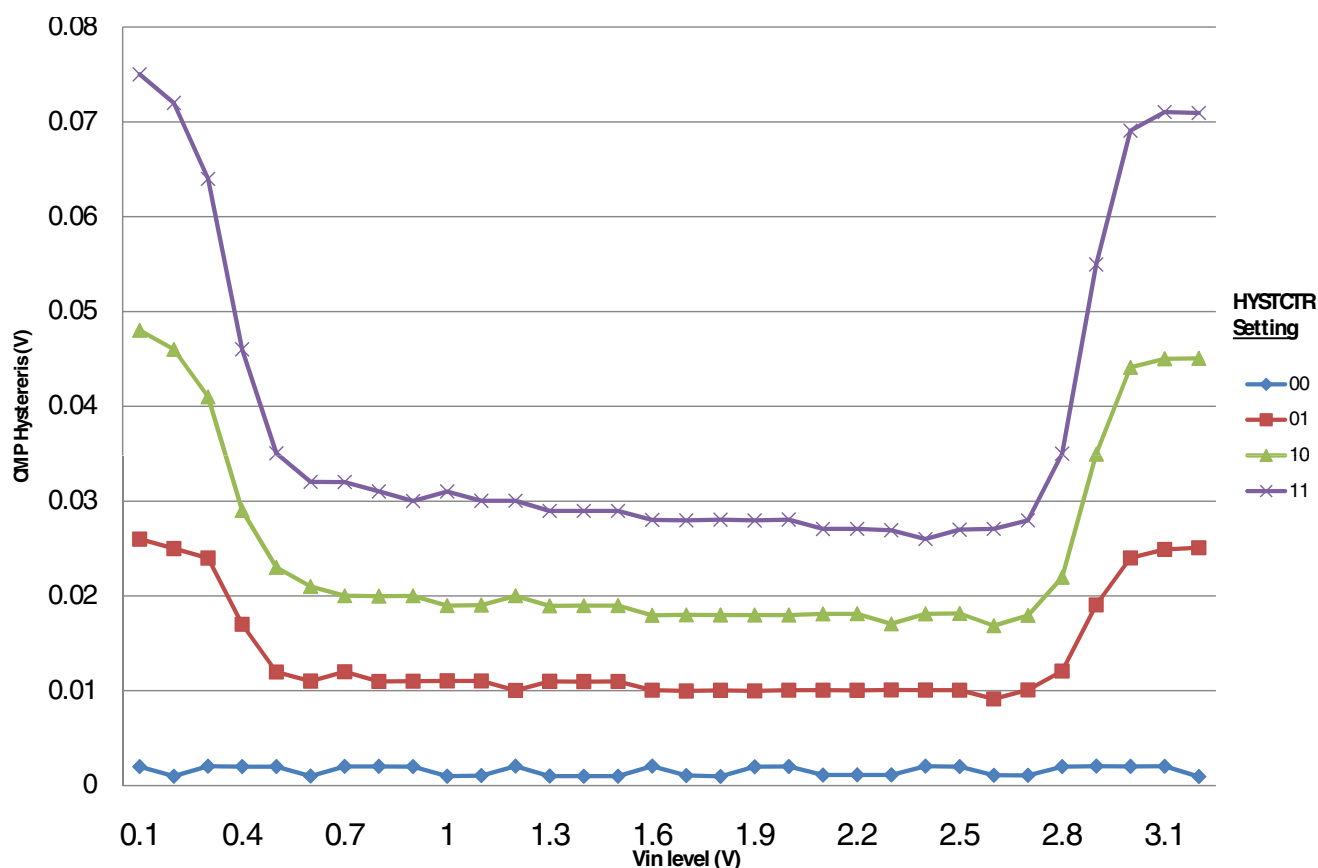

Figure 15. Typical hysteresis vs. Vin level (VDD=3.3V, PMODE=0)

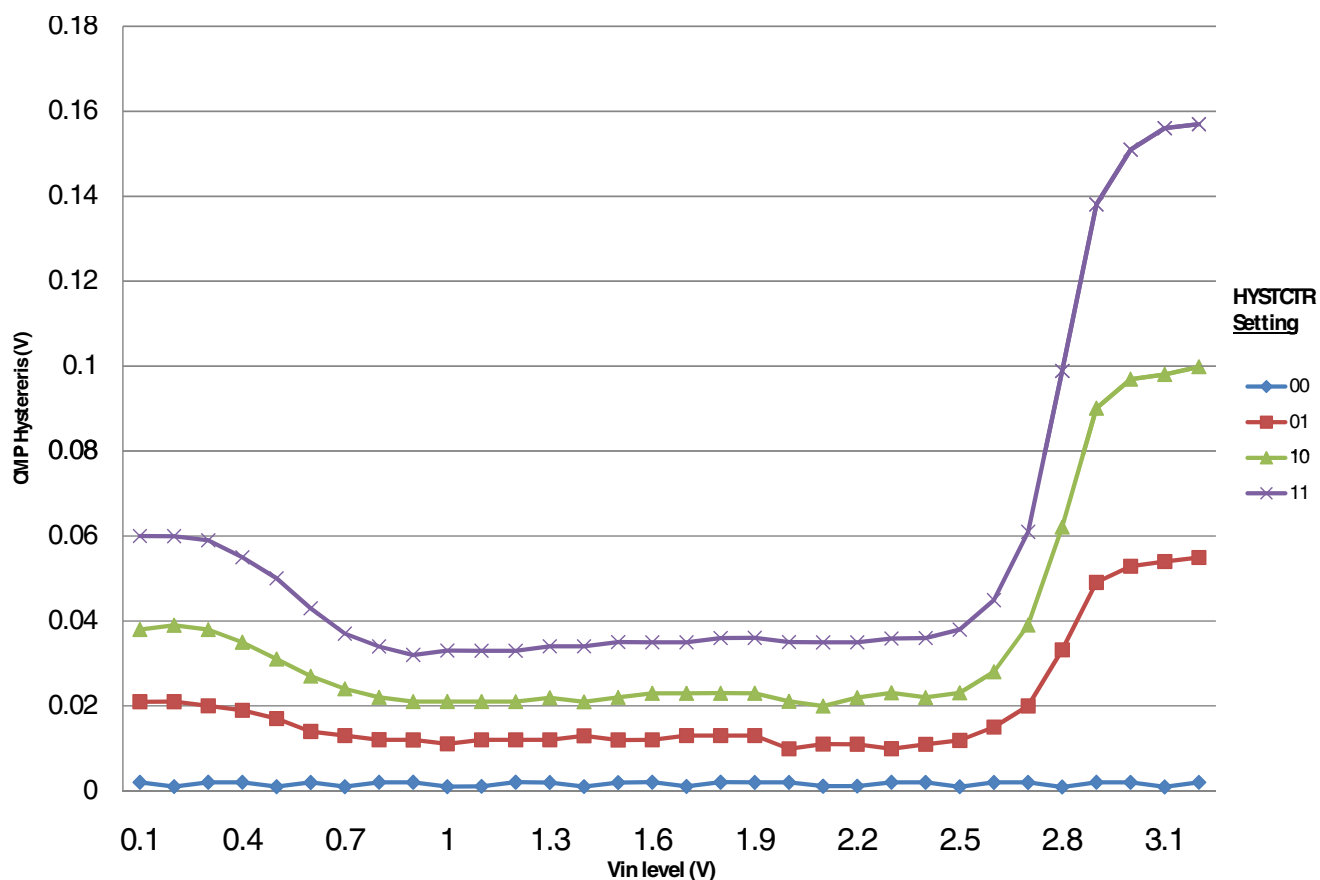


Figure 16. Typical hysteresis vs. Vin level (VDD=3.3V, PMODE=1)

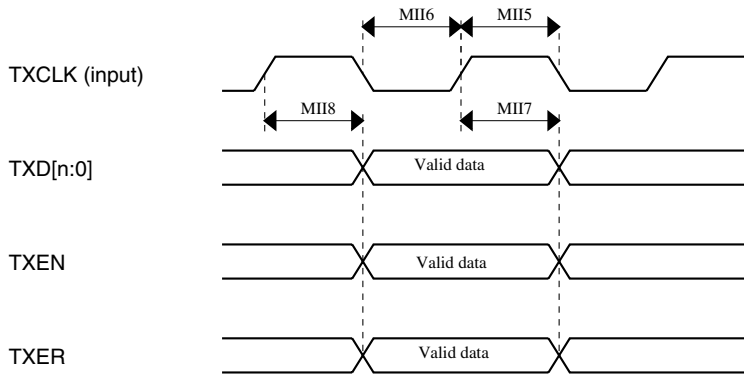


Figure 19. MII transmit signal timing diagram

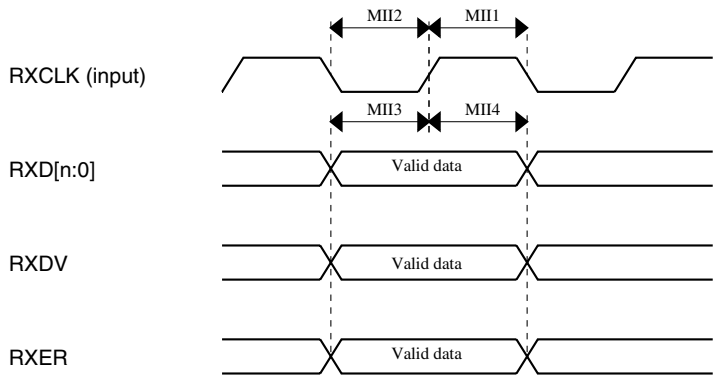


Figure 20. MII receive signal timing diagram

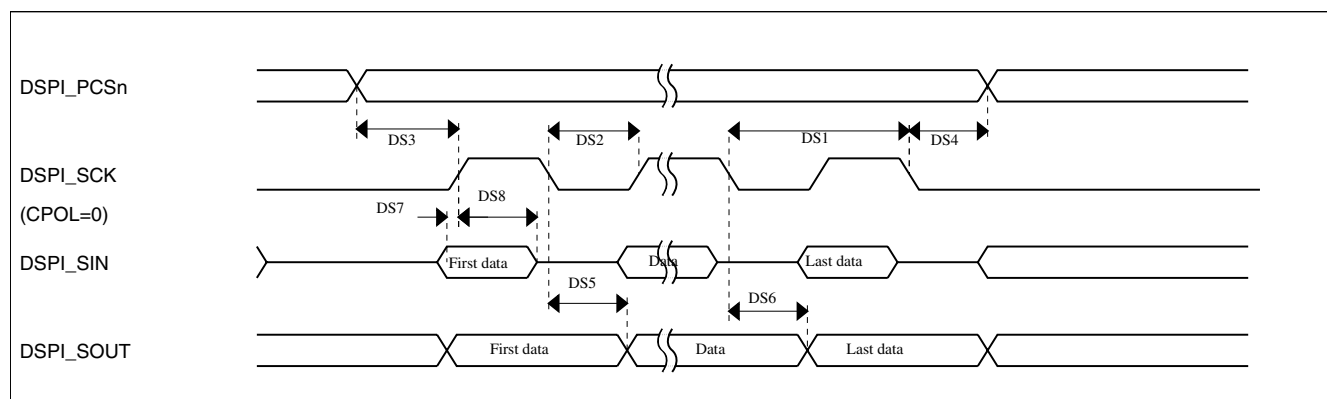
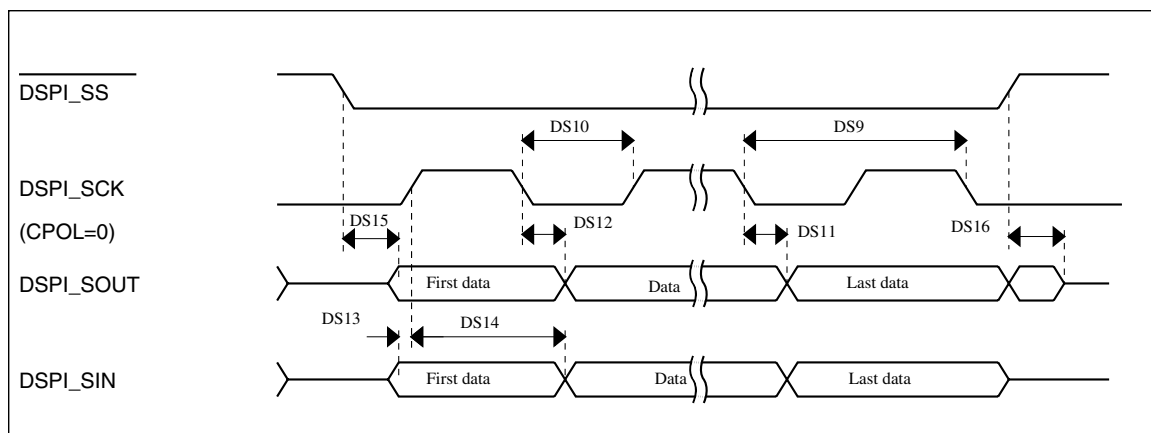


Figure 21. DSPI classic SPI timing — master mode

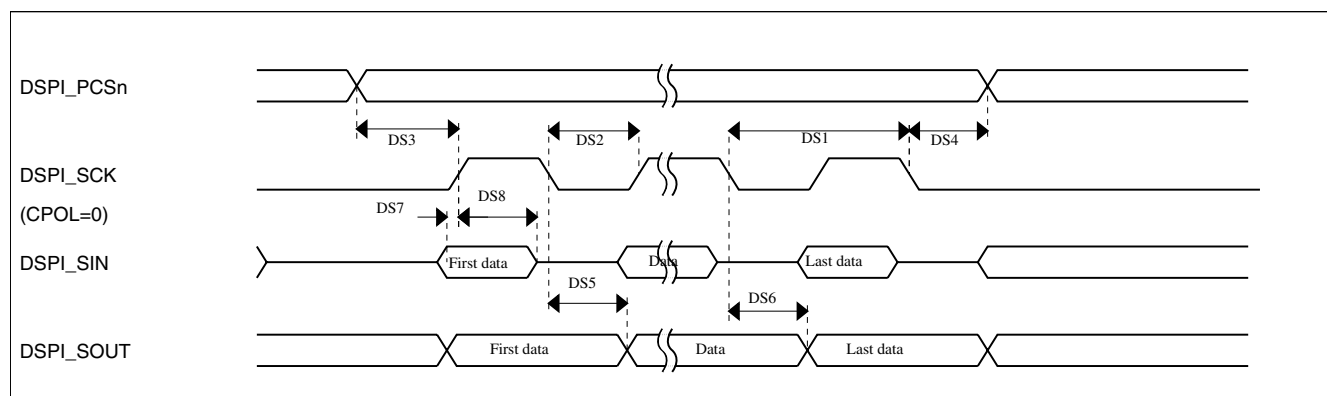

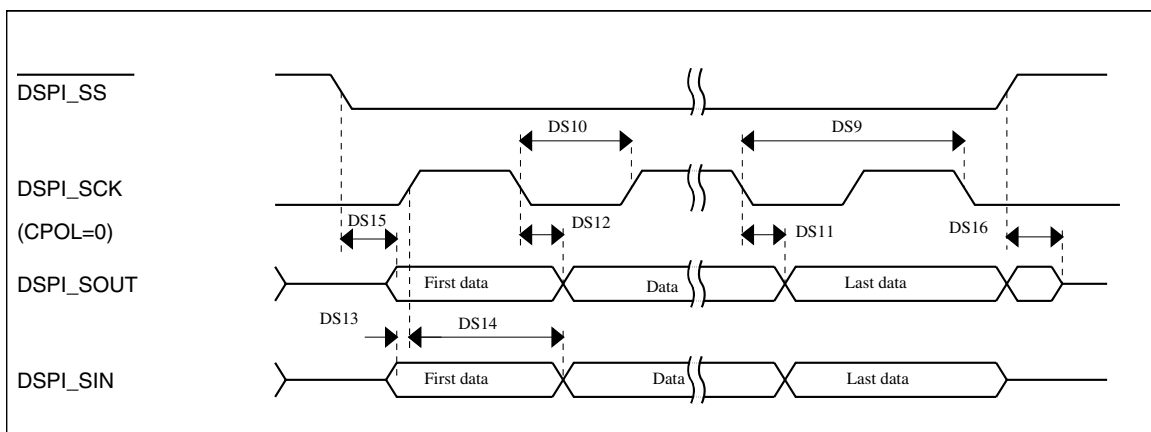


Figure 24. DSPI classic SPI timing — slave mode

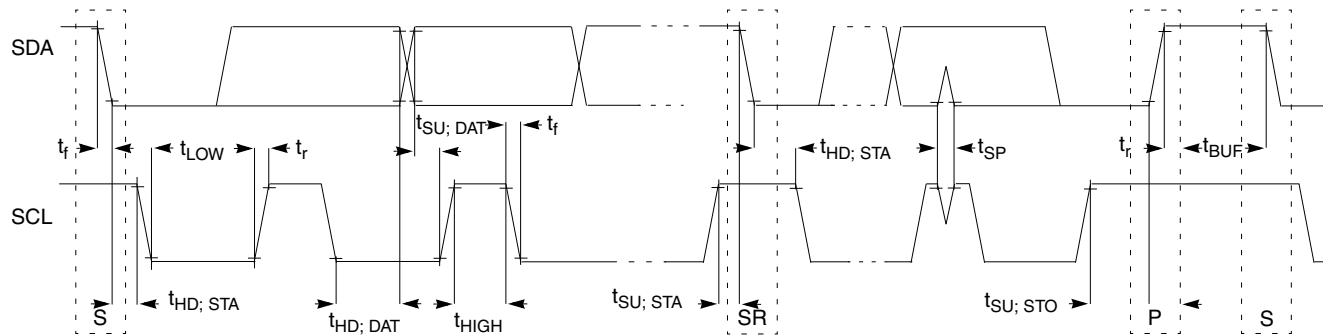


Figure 25. Timing definition for fast and standard mode devices on the I²C bus

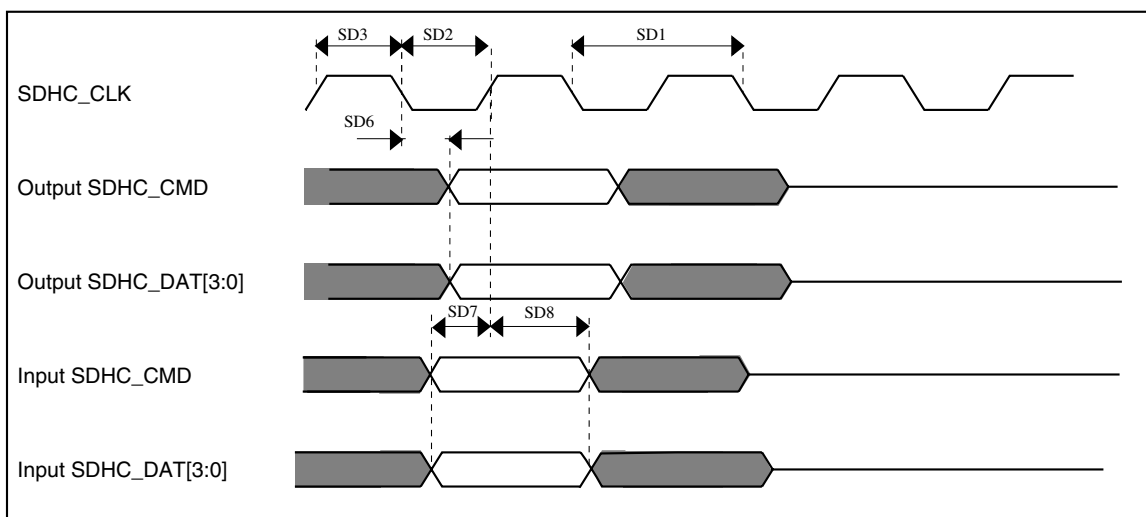


Figure 26. SDHC timing

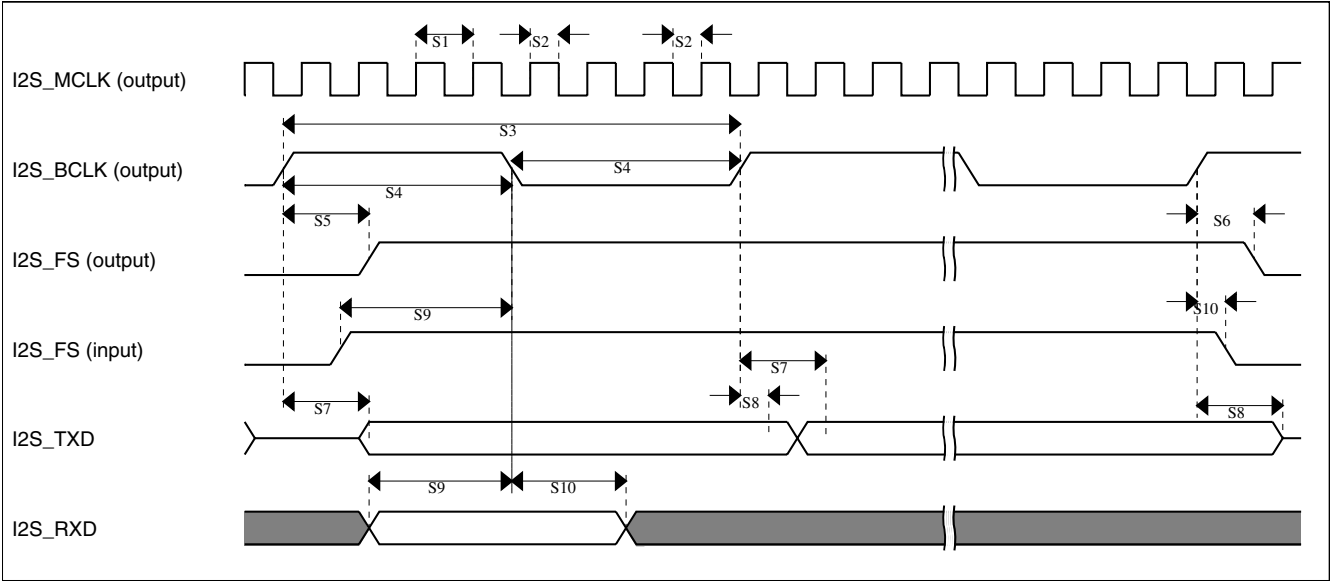


Figure 27. I²S timing — master mode

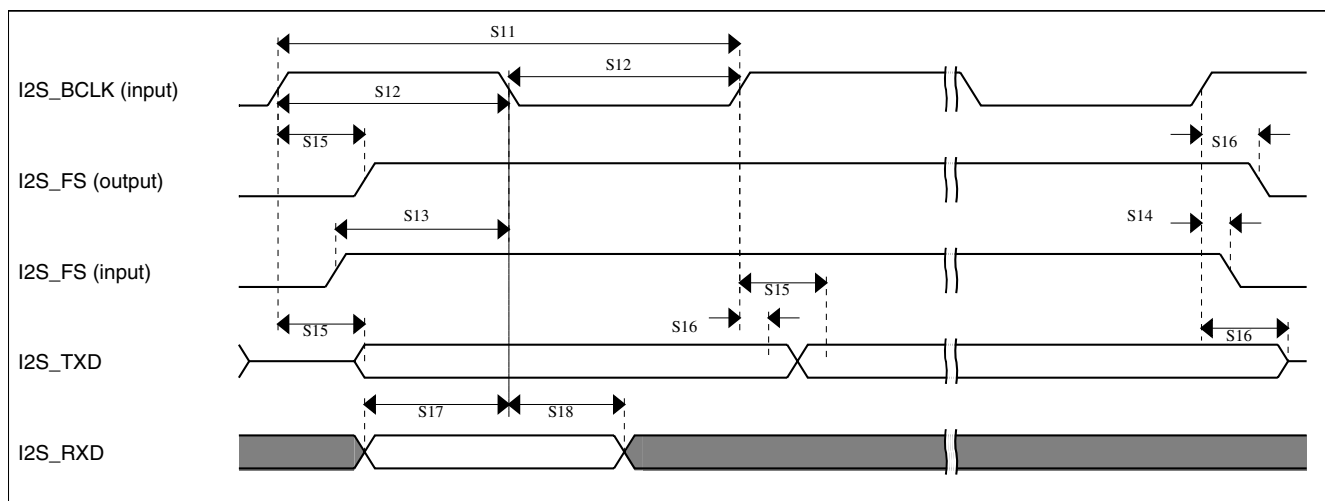


Figure 28. I²S timing — slave modes
